<b>Course description</b>	<p><i>Management and Organizations</i> examines the principles, theories, and practices that shape the leadership and administration of educational institutions. The course explores how schools, universities, and other educational organizations are structured, governed, and managed to achieve their goals effectively. Key themes include organizational theory, planning and decision-making, leadership styles, communication, stakeholder engagement, and the management of resources and people. Students will also analyze organizational behavior, school culture, and climate while learning strategies for monitoring, evaluation, and continuous improvement. Special emphasis is placed on strategic management, innovation, ethical and legal considerations, and the emerging global trends influencing the future of education. By combining theoretical perspectives with practical case studies, the course prepares students to understand and address the complex challenges of managing modern educational institutions.</p>	

<b>Course objectives</b>	<p>This course provides an in-depth exploration of the principles, practices, and challenges of managing educational institutions in a dynamic and evolving global context. Students will examine core management and organizational theories and apply them to schools, universities, and other educational organizations. The course emphasizes strategic planning, leadership, governance, and the effective use of resources to enhance institutional performance and student outcomes. Learners will critically analyze organizational behavior, communication strategies, and stakeholder engagement while addressing ethical, legal, and cultural dimensions of educational management. Special attention will be given to innovation management, monitoring and evaluation systems, and the emerging trends that are shaping the future of education leadership and governance.</p>
