	Self-video Recording.			
	Students record a video narration of the read short stories or any other subject of their own choice relevant to their disciplines, in their mobile phones for five minutes. The recorded works can be			
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	displayed in the classroom and accordingly evaluated on their fluency, content, creativity,			
	vocabulary and structure.			
	Writing Project.			
	Every student is given an opportunity to conduct independent investigation on a topic, preferably			
	in their own field of study that interests her/him the most. For the selection of the topics, students			
	can consult their relevant teachers at their own departments. The length of the project, depending			
	on the level of her/his English, will be about 1500 words.			
	Attendance (Lateness): Attendance is important. Absences can be detrimental to one's grade			
	due to the number of class activities (presentations and class participation) and complexity of the			
	subject. For every three unexcused absences one (1) point will be deducted from the grade point			
	average. More than 10 unexcused absences is excessive. Free participation is discouraged.			
	<b>Missed exams or assignments:</b> Advance notification should be given if the student is unable to			
	attend a scheduled presentation or test. Full class participation and completion of assigned			
	homework are necessary.
