Course outline	<p>In this course, students will develop the foundational reading skills to think critically and function effectively in academic programming.</p> <p>Furthermore, students will engage with, and understand, textual and graphical information in various formats, and learn how to assess reading content in terms of accuracy, authority, and relevance.</p> <p>Finally, through independent novel study, students will progress from a personal interaction with a story, to an interaction rooted in a beginning level of literary analysis. In addition to the development of reading skills, students will improve their listening and speaking skills through structured group work and class discussion.</p>
