## Writing Project.

Every student is given an opportunity to conduct independent investigation on a topic, preferably in their own field of study that interests her/him the most. For the selection of the topics, students can consult their relevant teachers at their own departments. The length of the project, depending on the level of her/his English, will be about 1500 words.

**Attendance (Lateness):** Attendance is important. Absences can be detrimental to one's grade due to the number of class activities (presentations and class participation) and complexity of the subject. For every three unexcused absences one (1) point will be deducted from the grade point average. More than 10 unexcused absences is excessive. Free participation is discouraged.

**Missed exams or assignments:** Advance notification should be given if the student is unable to attend a scheduled presentation or test. Full class participation and completion of assigned homework are necessary.

**Academic Dishonesty:** Any plagiarism while studying will be severely penalized, including the possibility of receiving a non-pass for the course. Reference should be given to the sources used in one's work. However, any research paper consisting of references and citations only, without further analysis by the student, will not be acceptable either. Cheating during the tests will be penalized including the possibility of a zero mark on the test.
