Policy/Assessment	<p>Assessment</p> <p>Teamwork: Students are expected to work in groups of four or more and. help each other exchange and comprehend the information. Working in teams develops students' both creative and communicative skills.</p> <p>Writing projects: Students are required to write and rewrite paragraphs of about 120 words and use topic related vocabulary, phrases as well as current grammar.</p> <p>Active Reading Strategies: Students are required to read intensively and extensively both updated authentic informational texts (on science, history, education, environment etc.) and narratives that focus on building attitude, language and phonetic awareness, comprehension strategies, vocabulary development, writing skills, accuracy, creativity and imagination.</p> <p>SPEAKING: Students are required to speak in groups and perform monologues. Speaking is one of the most essential parts of language learning process, since it is implemented in everyday life and critically linked to all skills.</p> <p>Course policies</p> <p>Attendance (Lateness): Attendance is important. Absences can be detrimental to one's grade due to the number of class activities (presentations and class participation) and complexity of the subject. For every three unexcused absences one (1) point will be deducted from the grade point average. More than 10 unexcused absences are excessive. Free participation is discouraged.</p> <p>Missed exams or assignments: Advance notification should be given if the student is unable to attend a scheduled presentation or test. Full class participation and completion of assigned homework are necessary.</p> <p>Academic Dishonesty: Any plagiarism while studying will be severely penalized, including the possibility of receiving a non-pass for the course. Reference should be given to the sources used in one's work. However, any research paper consisting of references and citations only, without further analysis by the student, will not be acceptable either. Cheating during the tests will be penalized including the possibility of a zero mark on the test.</p> <p>Topics of presentations / project papers will be pre-determined by the instructor. Free presentations / paper topics are not allowed. Presentation in cooperation with other students is allowed if pre-agreed with the instructor.</p>
