Presentations are held in groups of four on the day designated by the Senior lecturer (which will be reflected in the syllabus and announced to students in the first two lessons) and that day is the deadline for the presenter.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. The presentation should be written in handwritten (not copy +paste) form. 2. A slide show must be shown as a visual aid. 		

				<p>3. Sources should be cited when writing the work. Reference rules will be provided by the Senior lecturer.</p> <p>4. At the end, a list of used literature should be added.</p> <p>Note: Plagiarism is strictly prohibited! Students should not plagiarize when making the presentation, refer to the sources of the information they have obtained and show the references. The work is reset when 25% or more cases of Plagiarism (except for the cases of indicating the source of relevant references) are detected in the presentation submitted by the students to the teacher for evaluation.</p> <p>Quizzes</p> <p>During the course, two Quizzes are planned. One quiz will be held pre- midterms exam, the other one will be held pre-final exam. Test work (Quiz) 1 mainly topics 11-15, Test work Every Quizzes is evaluated with 5 points.</p> <p>Exams</p> <p>The admission of student for the exam and other issues regarding the participation of student in the exam is solving with the faculty Dean.</p> <p>With the theme of an exam questions students are acquainted in advance.
