The paper is expected to employ academic methodological tools to explore the research question and base its argumentation with the assistance of theoretical tools learned in the course. The paper is expected to give a summary of the research and findings. It should contain an introduction, main body and conclusion. Please do not hesitate to consult me (in person, via email) about your papers, if need be. You can use any citation style you are accustomed to.

You are expected to:

- attend classes on a regular basisas the classess are conducted in a combined lecture/seminat format where students should <u>play an active part</u>.
- read the assigned and suggested readings before you come to class
- engage actively in classroom discussions
- offer thoughtful and informed classroom presentations and written work
- submit all yourassignments on time
