It covers the origins and development of political thought, the structures and functions of governments, political ideologies, comparative politics, international relations, and the role of citizens in political processes. Students will also analyze contemporary global political challenges.

Assessment and Academic Policies

Attendance (5%) is determined based on students' participation in class. Students who miss more than 25% of the classes will not be allowed to take the final exam. In case of illness or other valid reasons, relevant documentation must be submitted to the faculty dean's office.

Participation (10%) is assessed based on students' active engagement in class discussions, Q&A sessions, and contributions to course-related debates through independent research.

Quizzes (10%): Two quizzes will be conducted throughout the semester to assess students' continuous understanding of the course material. Each quiz consists of 12 multiple-choice questions (0.5 points each) and two open-ended questions (2 points each). The total score for both quizzes is out of 10 points, and the final quiz grade will be calculated as the average of both quiz results.

Group Work (5%): Students will form small groups to simulate political systems (e.g., parliamentary democracy, presidential system, authoritarian regime). Each group will represent a government, opposition, media, and civil society, debating policy issues in a role-play exercise. Evaluation is based on realism, research, argumentation, and collaboration.

♣ Creativity and originality in students' work will be particularly valued.

Coursework (Presentation) (10%): Students must conduct research on a selected topic and deliver a 15-minute presentation. Assessment will be based on content quality, analytical approach, and presentation skills. Topics will be determined collectively with students during the fourth week of the course. Students are expected to demonstrate academic research skills and present their topics in a well-structured and substantiated manner.

<u>Presentation Preparation Guidelines</u>: The presentation should begin with a title slide that includes the presenter's name and topic. The introduction should briefly introduce the topic, state its purpose, and provide an overview of the presentation. The main content must be structured logically and divided into clear sections. The conclusion should summarize the key points discussed. A references slide must be included for proper citation.

!! Timely submission of assignments is a primary evaluation criterion. Late submissions will incur a penalty unless a valid reason is provided and approved in advance.

Examinations (60%): The course includes midterm and final examinations designed to assess students' understanding, analytical abilities, and critical thinking skills. The questions are open-ended, and the evaluation will consider the accuracy and depth of content rather than length. Review sessions or clarification opportunities will be provided before the exam to support student understanding.

!! Any attempt to disrupt the exam process, engage in cheating, or use unauthorized materials is strictly prohibited. Violation of these rules will result in the exam being invalidated and a grade of "0" being recorded.

Passing Requirements: To successfully complete the course, students must achieve an overall grade of at least 60%. Those who fail must retake the course

in the following semester or academic year.

Academic Integrity

The following violations constitute serious breaches of academic conduct and will result in disciplinary actions:

- **Plagiarism** Using others' ideas or research without proper citation.
- Unauthorized Collaboration Failing to complete individual assignments or exams independently.
