Course objectives	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Understand what politics encompasses and different approaches to political analysis.</li><li>2. Introduce students to the main political ideologies and their influence on political systems.</li><li>3. Examine the role of the state in political governance and various interpretations of its function.</li><li>4. Explore the relationship between democracy and political legitimacy and discuss the various forms of democratic governance.</li><li>5. Understand different political systems and regimes that exist around the world and their characteristics.</li><li>6. Analyse the role of nationalism in contemporary politics and its impact on global and national identities.</li></ol>		
Learning outcomes	<p>1.Discuss the intersection of economics and politics, focusing on the different forms of capitalism and the global economy.</p> <p>2.Explore the rise of identity politics and how identity shapes political behaviour and policies.</p> <p>3.Examine how culture and media influence politics, particularly in the age of social media and misinformation.</p> <p>4.Understand the mechanics of political representation, the role of elections, and party politics in shaping government and policy.</p> <p>5.Analyse the importance of constitutions, legal systems, and leadership in political governance.</p> <p>Explore international politics, the role of global institutions, and assess whether politics is "broken" in contemporary times.</p>

Policy	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Preparation for class</li> </ul> <p>The structure of this course makes your individual study and preparation outside the class extremely important. The lecture material will focus on the major points introduced in the text. Reading the assigned chapters and having some familiarity with them before class will greatly assist your understanding of the lecture. After the lecture, you should study your notes and work relevant problems from the end of the chapter and sample exam questions. After each lesson for the next class all students are required to be well-prepared and answer the questions. The core reading materials are emphasized in <b><i>bold italic</i></b> scripts in respective places in the tentative schedule. The rest of the given materials are supplementary and are highly advised to read. <b>If a student shows irresponsible manner and does not get prepared for the class for more than 2 successive lessons appropriate marks will be deduced.</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Withdrawal (pass/fail)</li> </ul> <p>This course strictly follows grading policy of the School of Humanities and Social Sciences. Thus, a student is normally expected to achieve a mark of at least 60% to pass. In case of failure, he/she will be required to repeat the course the following term or year.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Cheating</li> </ul> <p>Cheating or other plagiarism during the Quizzes, Mid-term and Final Examinations will lead to paper cancellation. For each class students are expected to digest the material and be well prepared for the discussion. Further reading and fresh ideas are welcomed. For their active participation in total, 10 points will be added to the final marks.

- Case Study/Book Presentation

**Case Studies (Presentations):** Students will be assigned different topics. They will do mini research and present their findings in a Power Point slideshow. The deadline for this project is different for each student which will be assigned randomly based on draw and failure to meet this deadline will result in a score of "0" for this section. Further details will be shared with them during the class for “how to do”.

**Book Presentation:** Students will be assigned a book by the instructor. They will be required to read the book and present its key ideas, analysis, and personal reflections.

- Exams

To assess students' preparedness in the course, both mid-term and final exams will be administered, with the specific dates determined by the dean's office. Typically, mid-term exams will commence around the midpoint of the course, while the final exam will be scheduled at the conclusion of the course. On the exam paper, students will encounter 7 potential questions, but they are only required to select and respond to 5 of them. Each chosen question in the mid-term and final exams holds a weight of 6 points. The questions are open-ended, and the evaluation will consider the development of English language skills, comprehension of the question, and the organization of the answers, aiming to enhance these aspects during the assessment process.

- Book reading

Student will be assigned to read a selected geopolitics masterpiece during each term and at the end there will be all group involved debate and discussion. It should be noted that those books are different from core reading and suggested reading.

- Quizzes

There will be only one quiz during the semester. It will consist of 20 multiple-choice questions, each worth 0.5 points, for a total of 10 points.
