Course Description This course provides an in-depth examination of various mental disorders through multiple theoretical perspectives, including but not limited to biological, psychological, and sociocultural approaches. Students will explore the diagnostic criteria, epidemiology, etiology, and treatment methods associated with each disorder. Special attention will be given to issues such as gender differences, developmental considerations (particularly in children and adolescents), and the cultural context of mental health. By the end of the course, students will have a comprehensive understanding of common psychological disorders, their symptoms, causes, and evidence-based interventions. Course Aims This course in Psychopathology is designed to provide students with a comprehensive understanding of a wide range of mental disorders across the lifespan. The primary aim is to equip students with knowledge of key theoretical frameworks, including biological, psychological, and sociocultural perspectives, and to foster critical evaluation of current diagnostic systems and classifications. Through the exploration of case studies and contemporary research, students will develop practical skills in clinical assessment, diagnosis, and treatment planning. Emphasis will be placed on ethical considerations, cultural sensitivity, and interdisciplinary approaches to mental health. By the end of the course, students will be well-prepared for advanced academic study or professional roles within mental health, clinical psychology, social work, counseling, or related fields. **Learning Outcomes** By the end of this course, students will be able to: Demonstrate a comprehensive understanding of mental disorders across the lifespan, including their symptoms, diagnostic criteria, and evidence-based treatments. Critically evaluate research methods used in the field of psychopathology, including experimental, clinical, and epidemiological approaches. Analyze and discuss major theoretical, ethical, and practical issues related to the diagnosis and treatment of mental disorders. Identify and challenge common misconceptions and stigma associated with mental illness, promoting a more compassionate and informed perspective.
